I am very glad to be part of Good Neighbors International Philippines and welcoming you to this Annual Report sharing the accomplishments and achievements from 2022.

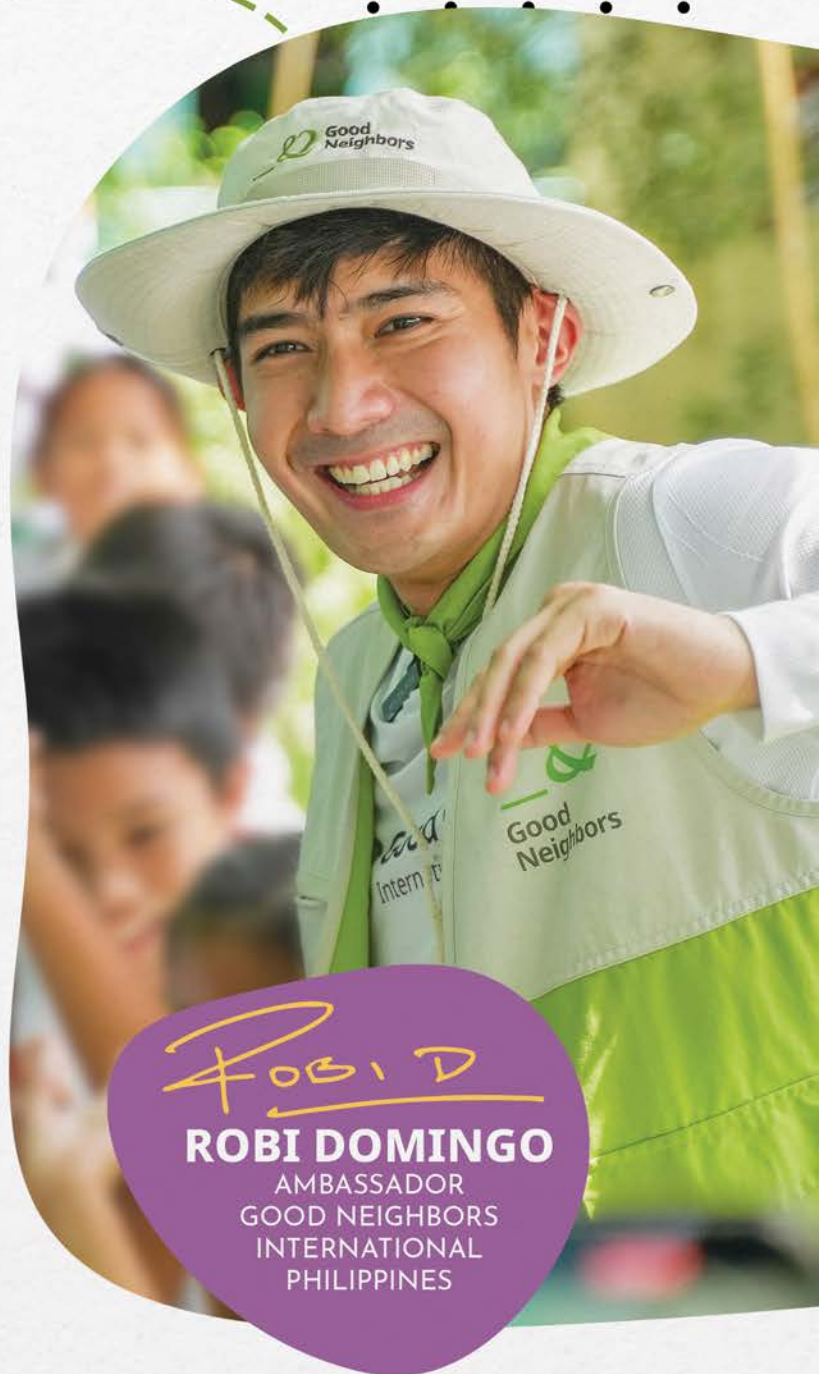

Good Neighbors Philippines launched the first-ever WAVE TALK event under the theme "Empower through Social Responsibility." Envisioned to be the first of many similar events, WAVE Talk is designed to foster stimulating conversations, innovativeness, and inspiration among the youth.

WAVE, an acronym for Words Amplifying the Virtue of Empowerment, aims to ignite dialogue, forge connections, and empower young individuals through captivating talks spanning diverse subjects such as science and technology, agriculture and entrepreneurship, and climate change.

WAVE Talk revolved around three sub-themes: Driving Action to Climate Change; Enabling Social Entrepreneurship; and Science and Technology Revolution.

As the youth aspire to become better and wiser, WAVE Talk starts their transformative journey to becoming empowered change agents in society. WAVE Talk gives them the opportunity to gain broader perspectives, boost their personal growth, and collaborate with esteemed experts to establish their chosen advocacies. WAVE Talk bridges the gap by positioning youth to go beyond their role as catalysts for change, and become active participants and implementers of change.

Josh Daniel is one of the inspiring youth scholars in one of the development project areas in Hagonoy, Bulacan, where the main source of income and access to higher education is a challenge. They had to ride a boat to the mainland to attend school. Since they are living in an island community, flooding is very prone in their area.

This program allowed him to interact with other youth participants from other countries to create and understand global citizenship by expressing their opinions on global issues. It also gave him a glimpse into the real state of their countries and the good actions being made to address the issues they also encounter, such as the pressing threat of Climate Change.

Different international exchange activities were done through discussions on community problems and drawing innovative solutions. These activities promote awareness of the issues arising in their communities and empower them as global citizens in being involved in solving these issues.

Building Dreams for a Better Future

Living on the beautiful island of Guiuan, Eastern Samar, Kaila needs to commute by boat for 30 minutes to an hour to reach her school, which is in the town proper. Apart from the logistic challenge, the cost of traveling to school is also a concern for Kaila's family.

Her father who used to work as a shell collector now works in a chicken poultry farm and her mother offers laundry services. Their income is just enough for their survival and daily needs.

Described by her parents as obedient and hardworking, Kaila is dedicated to her education as she strives to realize her dream of becoming an engineer.

The scholarship support she receives, including school supplies, uniforms, transportation allowance, and meal allowance, has enabled her to focus more on her studies.

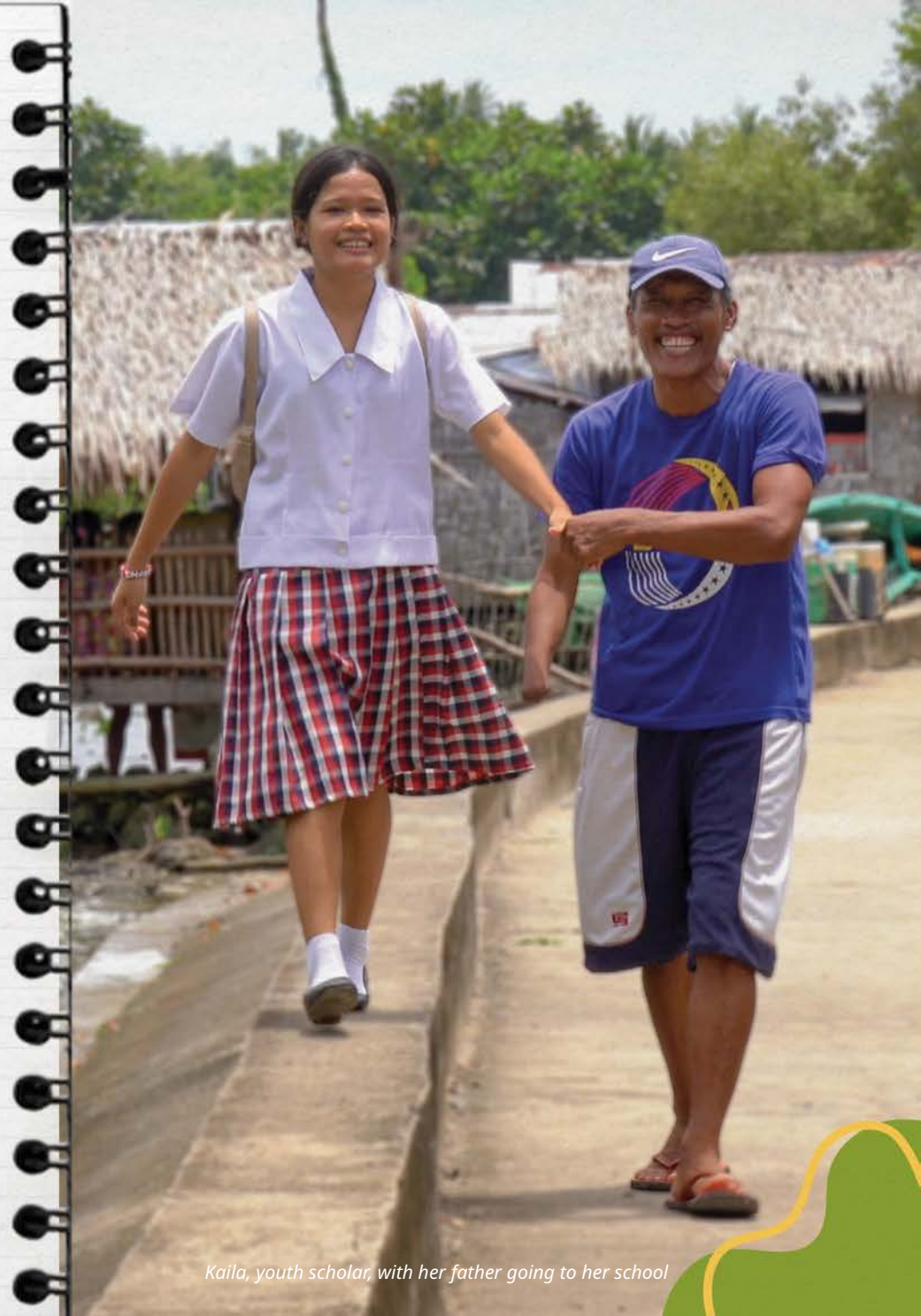

Sitio Bakal, located in Quezon City, is a marginalized community where families face significant challenges due to the absence of essential services in their area. Consequently, academically exceptional students in this community often lack the necessary support for their education.

Through the efforts of Good Neighbors International Philippines Ambassador Robi Domingo, ten youth scholars have received laptops that will play a crucial role in addressing the educational needs of these students. With this, they will now have the necessary tools to enhance their learning experience and overcome the obstacles they face.

BRINGING INCLUSION TO LIGHT IN THE COMMUNITY

With the increasing awareness about the rights of the children with disability to have access to the same educational services as children without disabilities, it has led to inclusive education, according to UNESCO International Bureau of Education (2009).

To address the issue and challenges in diversity and inclusivity in education, the **Inclusion for Learning Accommodation and Welfare, or ILAW Project** in partnership with Sun Life Foundation is being implemented since its launching in 2021.

This project emphasizes access to quality education for children with disabilities and setting up systems and mechanisms in the local government unit (both at the barangay and city levels) and partner schools.

With the partnership between the Quezon City (QC) Kabahagi Center for Children with Disabilities or Kabahagi Center, ILAW Project has been institutionalized and signed between Good Neighbors Philippines and Kabahagi Center with Ms. Karen Sagun, Director, and QC Mayor Joy Belmonte.

Another milestone of the project is the approval of Barangay Resolution which granted the Barangay Bagong Silangan Disability Inclusive Center for children and youth. This policy has supported the institutionalization of the ILAW project at the barangay level. Remarkably, this is the first barangay in Quezon City that was able to pass and solidify into policy the welfare of children and youth with disabilities. Now, the center launched during National Children's Month has now access to free developmental and rehabilitation services for the children and their parents. Additionally, the center is equipped with learning aids and materials.

The ILAW Project will continue through the capacity building using the developed Information, Education, and Communication materials focused on the rights of children and health awareness.

According to the Council for the Welfare of Children, almost 9,000 child abuse cases were reported throughout the country and some of them were happening inside their homes. Thus, laws that will establish child protection systems are very vital to ensure the safety of children from abuse and exploitation.

Particularly to Prieto Diaz, Sorsogon, despite the presence of Local Child Protection Committees (LCPC), there is still a need to provide resources and support to prevent children from being harmed and to adopt a robust system to address cases of abuse.

To address this, the special project dubbed "Inclusive Community that is Aware, Responsive, and Engaged in Children's Protection Project" or ICARE Project will address the needs of the children and strengthen the child protection system in Prieto Diaz, Sorsogon.

It is focused on strengthening child protection systems including its policies, coordination across service providers, preventive and responsive care, workforce roles, and capacity building.

The project achieved the establishment of ICARE Hub, a child-friendly space for abused children and the first model in the Philippines. It is a "one-stop-shop" facility for handling abuse cases of women and children in Prieto Diaz and strengthening case management of abuse cases through the multidisciplinary approach.

Moreover, the multi-disciplinary team, consisting of social workers, physicians, women, and child protection desk officers was trained on handling cases of abuse which is being done through the multidisciplinary approach, ensuring confidentiality and avoiding trauma recursion of victims.

GIGMOTO, CATANDUANES

In Gigmoto, Catanduanes, it has been identified that diarrhea remains to be one of the top causes of death in Gigmoto. This is largely due to a lack of access to safe water sources in the household.

Moreover, the recent typhoon roly has made it more difficult to build effective water distribution systems in Catanduanes. In Barangay Sioron, Sitio Sawa is one of the communities that were greatly affected by Typhoon Rolly. This left massive damage to natural resources and their water supply since households rely on deep wells and hand pumps that are untreated and unsafe for drinking. Clean water became hard to get.

Residents climbing mountains and crossing rivers for a gallon of water became part of their everyday routine. These paths become impassable when it rains.

To have access to clean and safe water is one of the twelve Filipino basic rights of the child and this means that children should not be burdened with such physically demanding tasks.

To solve this problem, Good Neighbors Philippines built a water tank and water reservoir that will provide water to each household and public school in April's community through the Securing Access to Flourish Empowerment for Water or SAFE for Water Project.

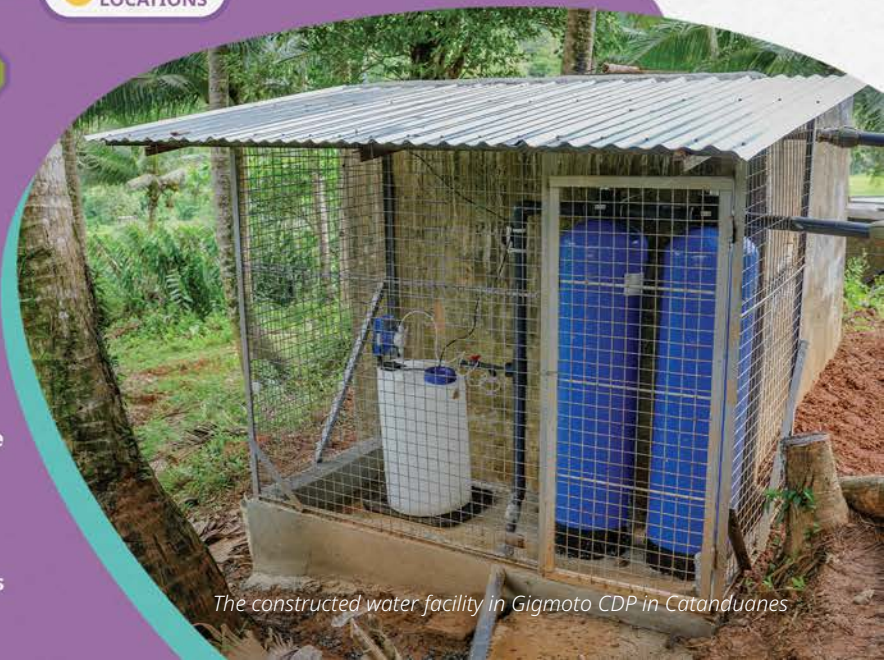

This aims to improve the access to water for drinking and domestic use in Gigmoto, Catanduanes, and capacitate and equip community members on the proper usage of the water facility for its sustainability.

In support of this, Barangay Water and Sanitation Association or BAWASA was organized in the nine villages, health workers and community leaders were capacitated, barangay ordinances were developed to support water access and maintenance, and Information, Education, and Communication materials were also developed.

Now, the children of Sitio Sawa do not have to walk on treacherous terrain in order to survive. Part of bridging dreams and giving hope to the marginalized and disadvantaged sectors includes ensuring that children like April stay healthy and have access to safe water.

A Child's Heart is Full of Hope



Princess Nica, a 14-year-old sponsored child from Guiuan, Eastern Samar, was diagnosed with Congenital Heart Disease shortly after birth. While her mother works abroad, Nica is primarily cared for by her grandmother. Despite her mother's income, their financial resources are barely sufficient to meet the family's basic needs, leaving little room to address Nica's critical heart condition.

After super typhoon Yolanda, medical missions were conducted in their area, and Nica's condition was further evaluated. Due to her insufficient weight gain and stunted growth, the doctor confirmed the severity of her condition and recommended immediate intervention.

Thankfully, the family received assistance from a generous donor, ensuring Nica's access to medications and covering the costs of her operation.

While undergoing medication, Nica's condition gradually improved, although she experienced chest tightness and difficulty breathing. She continued her studies but she couldn't participate in the sports activities she enjoyed.

In full hope and faith, Nica was able to be operated on successfully on October 19, 2022, through a device placed on her heart to close the vein. The device will become part of the normal tissues of the heart and this procedure has a 100% successful rate.

After the surgery, Nica is filled with joy and gratitude for being given a second chance at life. Now, she is very excited to do the things she wasn't able to do, especially participating in school activities and helping her family with household chores

SAFE TRANSPORTATION FOR A SAFE COMMUNITY

GUIUAN, EASTERN SAMAR

78,800 People

Julie Ann, an 18-year-old college student from Guiuan, Eastern Samar struggles with commuting to school.

During junior high school, she rode a tricycle and traveled 22 kilometers just to get to her school. Sometimes arriving late is also her difficulty because of the slowness and availability of the vehicle.

When modern jeepneys started to operationalize in Guiuan, her travel started to improve through the service provided by Sulangan Transportation Cooperative (STC).

With the modernization program of the government, GNI Philippines carry out the Safe, Accessible, and Environment-Friendly (SAEF) Public Transport Project that supported STC through a loan purchasing 7 units of Euro 4 vehicles with zero value of investment.

This project does not only ease off the struggle of students like Julie Ann but also provides employment opportunities and improves the income of drivers and cooperative members in the community development project.

This project has also improved the communities' access to health services. The frequent plying of vehicles in the community provides more frequent access to transportation, especially during emergency cases.

Moreover, this also will help reduce the impact of Climate Change because it contributes to making the air in Guiuan cleaner and safer for residents and commuters. There is an estimated reduction of around 240 kilograms of greenhouse gasses in Guiuan, specifically carbon monoxide, hydrocarbons, nitrous oxide, and particulate matter pollutants.

BRINGING HOPE IN THE LIVES OF THE PEOPLE FROM THE DISASTER

In December 2021, Super Typhoon Rai (Philippine Name “Odette”) brought destruction to lives, properties and livelihoods to many of our neighbors in the Philippines, especially in Bohol.

One of the affected families is Jeanette and her family who survived the ravaging effects of Typhoon Rai. However, her family lost her home and had to take shelter inside a chapel. Nicole, one of her daughters, recalled that she was very frightened at that time and had not yet experienced such a destructive storm. She tried her best to preserve her educational modules in a plastic bag before the storm hits. However, all her school materials were not spared.

Through the Build Back Better Program of Good Neighbors International Philippines (GNIP), Jeanette was one of the two beneficiaries of the house construction project to rebuild the hope lost by the Typhoon.

She expressed her appreciation for the enormous help to get back after the disaster, “A lot changed and we’re happy, super happy, as in very happy because our house is finally complete. When typhoon Paeng hit, we were assured that our house was strong. Our house cannot easily be damaged.”

Moreover, through Community Livelihood Recovery Support (CLRS) Program, a loan program that will support the farmers and fisherfolks to secure their process of rebuilding their source of income.

Through the campaign for Bohol survivors, these helped fund other livelihood recovery programs for farmers and fisherfolk in Candijay and President Carlos P. Garcia (CPG). The destroyed wooden boats were replaced with fiberglass boats that were built from scratch by the beneficiaries themselves. These are complemented with capacity building activities on financial management.

DISASTER RISK REDUCTION PROGRAMS MADE ACCESSIBLE AND INCLUSIVE FOR CHILDREN

The Inclusive Child-Centered Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (ICDRRM), in partnership with UNICEF, has improved the access and knowledge of inclusive child-led DRRM programs in target schools, barangays, and communities in Angeles City, Pampanga for the children with disabilities and indigenous children.vv

Good Neighbors Philippines successfully produced various modules and Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials on disaster risk reduction that are child-friendly which were also translated into Filipino and Kapampangan – the top two local languages in Angeles City.

These were collaboratively developed with subject matter experts and disability advocates. These materials were then distributed to schools and barangays in Angeles City through coordination with the Department of Education Schools Division Office.

The five (5) inclusive videos **featuring children with disabilities and indigenous children as main characters** reached more than 1,000,000 impressions after being premiered in Rappler, one of the leading media organizations in the Philippines.

With this, they are more prepared and equipped with the right information when emergencies and disasters strike their areas. At the same time, duty-bearers such as the school personnel and community leaders became more conscious and responsive to the special needs of children with disabilities and the indigenous children.

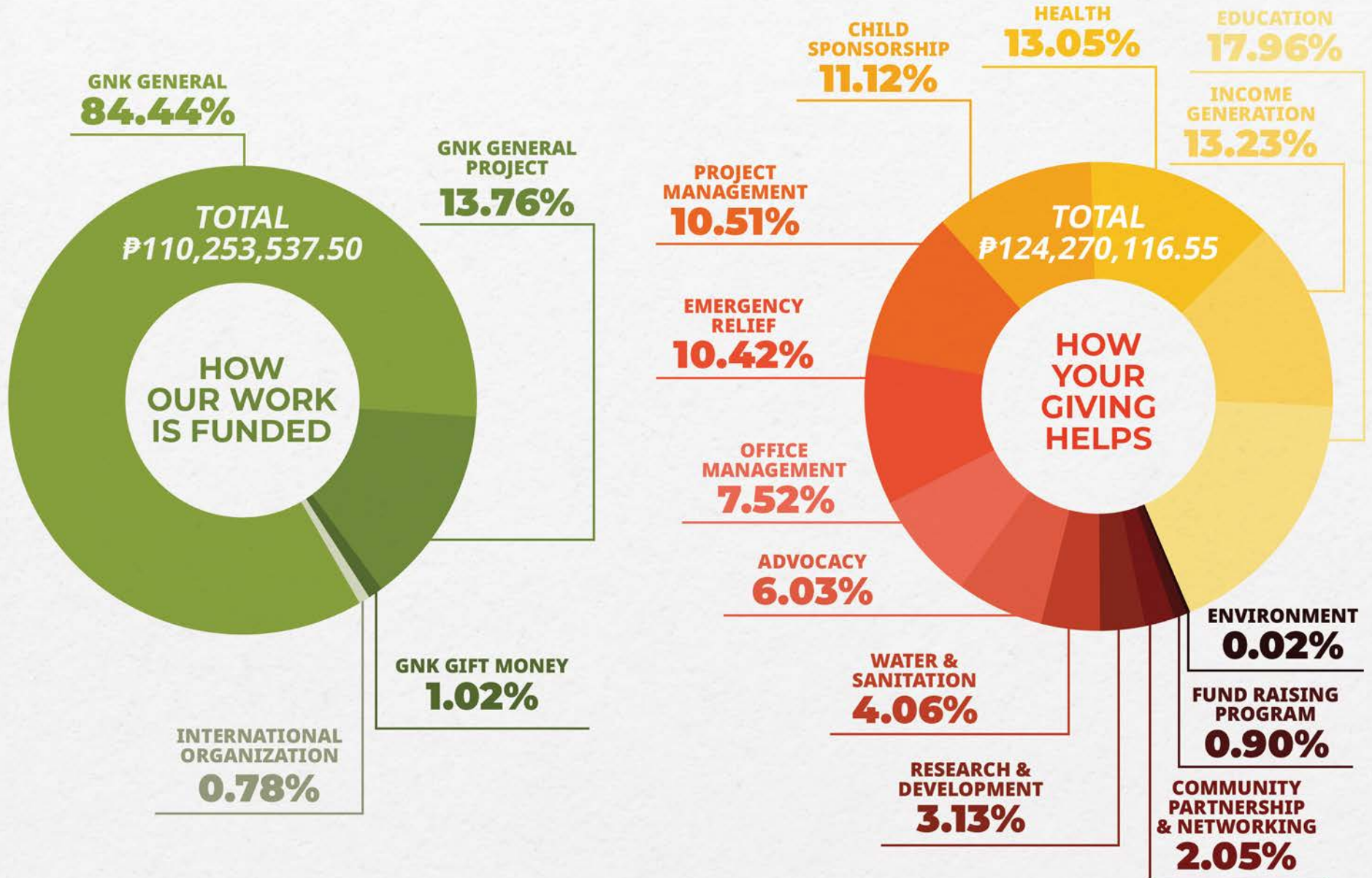

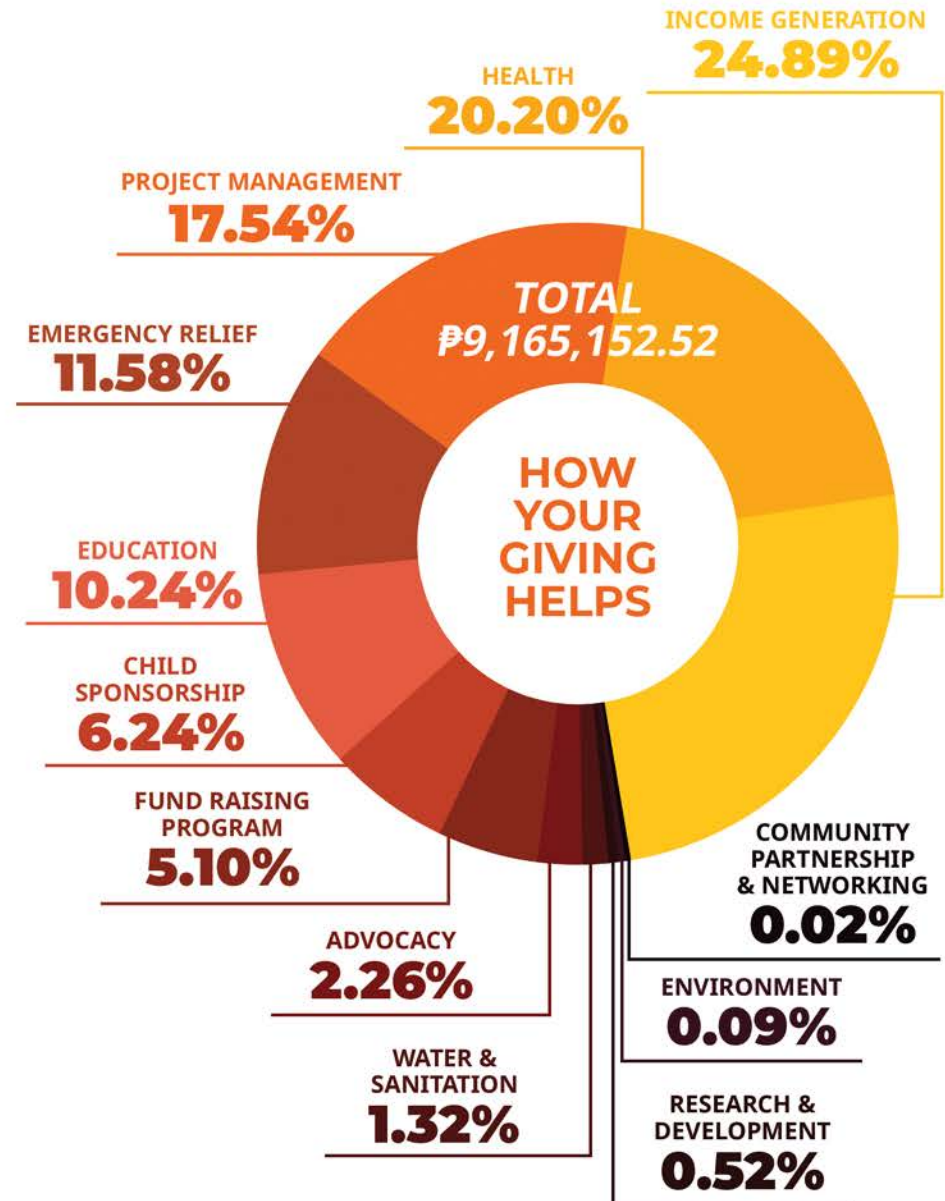
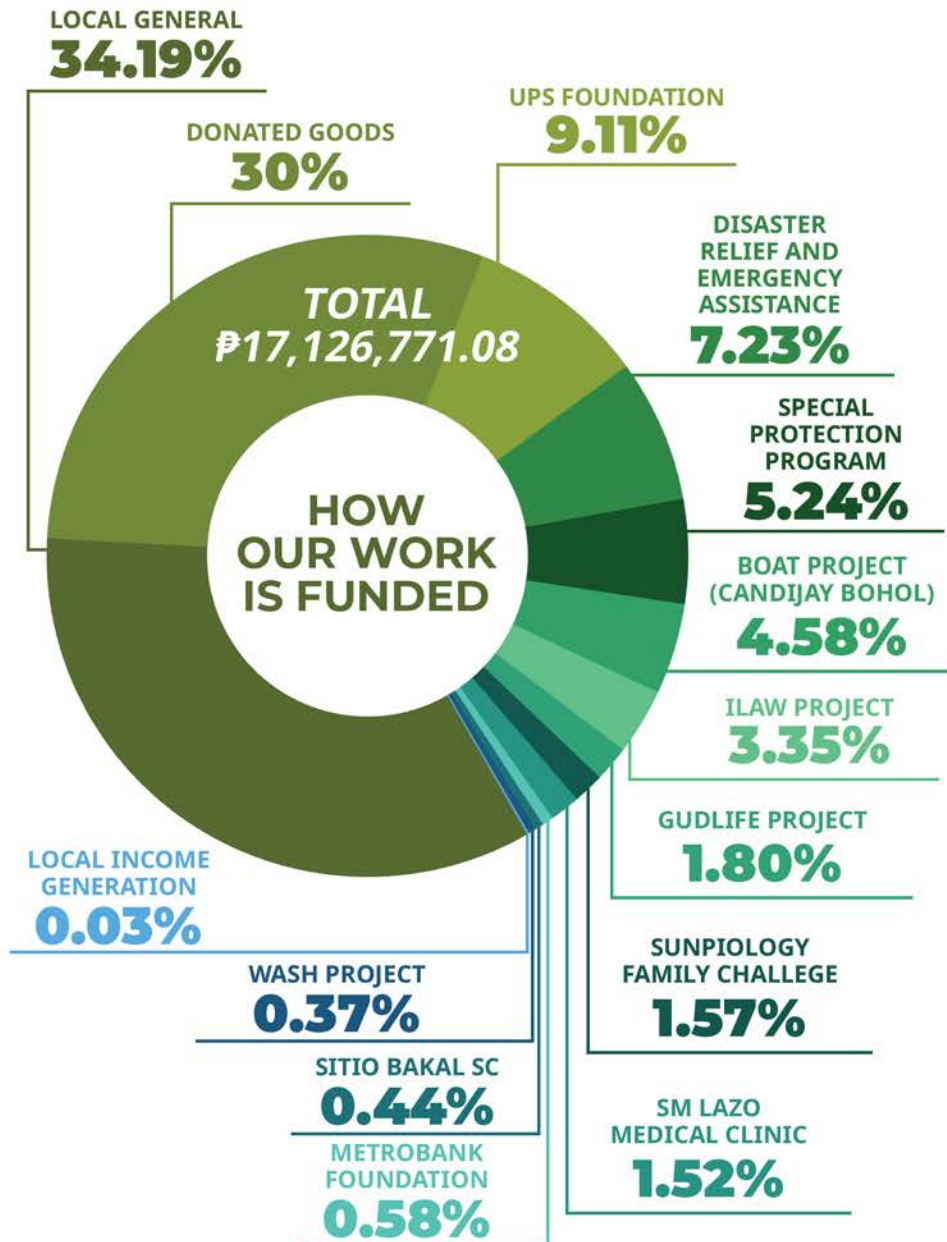
